

THE INTEGRATED HABITAT MANAGEMENT APPROACH TO VEGETATION

The practice of Integrated Habitat Management or IHM is the holistic approach to managing vegetation on Rights-of-Way. The primary goal of IHM on ROW is to balance the needs of maintenance and operation with the conservation of biodiversity and ecosystems. Typically, IHM considers the entire habitat within and adjacent to the ROW, rather than focusing solely on vegetation directly within the ROW. This approach recognizes that ROW corridors can serve as valuable habitat for various wildlife species. There is often collaboration between ROW Managers or Owners and environmental organizations, government agencies, and other stakeholders. These groups often have different perspectives, which can address multiple objectives, such as reducing maintenance costs, enhancing safety, and conserving biodiversity.

IHM incorporates various vegetation management techniques tailored to specific environmental characteristics of a ROW. These techniques may include selective mowing, targeted herbicide application, prescribed burning, and planting native vegetation. The goal is to maintain a diverse and hardy plant community that supports wildlife habitat while minimizing the need for mechanical management practices such as mowing or mulching. The purpose of IHM is to enhance the habitat for wildlife species that inhabit ROW corridors. This can involve creating wildlifefriendly vegetation zones, installing bird nesting nest structures, and planting pollinator habitats or plants native to the region. These are strategies to control invasive plant species that can outcompete native vegetation and disrupt the ecosystem.

It is typical to monitor the effectiveness of management practices and adjust strategies as needed. Routine monitoring of vegetation and wildlife populations ensures that the IHM objectives are being met. This type of vegetation management often helps promote better relationships between ROW owners and landowners or even whole communities. Engaging with local communities can foster support for IHM initiatives and encourage participation in conservation efforts.

Overall, IHM on ROW represents a proactive approach to managing Rights-of-way by promoting conservation while meeting the needs of ROW users and operators.

GLYPHOSATE TOXICITY MYTH

Glyphosate, the active ingredient in the popular product Roundup, is often greatly feared by the general public. Especially those who are unfamiliar with the chemical. There is a myth that Glyphosate is a highly toxic chemical. Many who a familiar with the chemical know that it has a lower acute toxicity to humans compared to many common household chemicals. Acute toxicity refers to the ability of a substance to cause harmful effects shortly after a single exposure or ingestion.

Glyphosate has a relatively low acute toxicity to humans when used as directed. The LD50, which means the "median lethal dose", of glyphosate in rats is relatively high, indicating that it is not highly toxic. Furthermore, glyphosate is classified as "slightly toxic" or "practically nontoxic" by various regulatory agencies when used according to label instructions.

In contrast, some household chemicals can pose significant acute toxicity risks if ingested, inhaled, or absorbed through the skin. For example:

Vinegar or Acetic Acid is generally safe for household use and ingestion in small quantities, concentrated acetic acid can be corrosive and pose risks if ingested in large amounts. Ingesting undiluted vinegar can lead to irritation of the throat, stomach, and gastrointestinal tract.

Table Salt or Sodium Chloride is commonly used in food and household applications, ingestion of large quantities of salt can lead to acute toxicity known as salt poisoning or hypernatremia. This can occur if someone ingests large amounts of salt at once or over a short period, leading to dehydration, electrolyte imbalance, and potentially life-threatening complications.

It's vital to handle all chemicals, including glyphosate, vinegar, and table salt, with care and follow proper safety precautions and usage instructions to minimize risks of exposure and toxicity. While glyphosate and most other herbicides have a lower acute toxicity compared to many household chemicals, proper handling, storage, and disposal are essential to ensure everyone's safety.
